



How to become a Pet Partners® Volunteer Therapy Animal Team

Welcome! Thank you for your interest in becoming registered with Pet Partners to volunteer with your pet! Your involvement will allow you and your pet to provide comfort, healing and joy to people in need. This document outlines the prerequisites and steps necessary to become registered with Pet Partners. **For more information, visit the Delta Society website at www.deltasociety.org/petpartners.**

Prerequisites

1. Handlers must be at least 10 years old. Handlers younger than 16 must have written permission to participate and be accompanied on visits by a parent or guardian.
2. Animals may not be fed a raw protein diet. Animals previously fed a raw protein diet must be off that diet for at least four weeks before registering with Pet Partners. For more information on the raw protein diet policy, visit www.deltasociety.org/rawdiet.
3. Animals should be healthy and already have a basic level of training. Cats/dogs must be at least 1 year old and must have lived with the handler for a minimum of 6 months. For other species, refer to www.deltasociety.org/species. Both handler and animal should have an interest in people and be comfortable in health care settings or other visiting environments. Handlers must also have good control of and proactive communication with the animal.
4. Animals with a history of biting or aggression or that are trained for protection or bite work, even if part of a dog sport (e.g., Schutzhund or hunting activities), are not eligible. Animals that have killed another animal are not eligible.

Four major steps to becoming a Pet Partners® Volunteer Therapy Animal Team

Step 1: Course work

1. Go to www.deltasociety.org/courses. NOTE: the Pet Partners® Handler Workshop is for you, not your pet.
2. Click on the name of your state. If the name of your state is not a hyperlink, click on the name of a surrounding state that is linked to a calendar. Courses are updated regularly, so a course may come available in your area at any time. NOTE: When displaying the calendar, it is best to select 4 months in advance.
3. If you are unable to find a workshop on the calendar, visit www.deltasociety.org/instructor to locate an instructor in your area.
4. If no workshops are being held in your area, you can take the online course. Visit www.deltasociety.org/onlinecourses for more information.

Step 2: Animal Health Screening

Different species have different health needs. Animals need to be healthy, friendly, sociable, and up-to-date (as required by your veterinarian and state laws) on vaccinations. Animals must be free of external and internal parasites. Proof of rabies vaccination and fecal exam results within the last 6 months must be included in your animal's health screening. Step 3: Team Evaluation

1. Go to www.deltasociety.org/evaluations
2. Click on the name of your state. If the name of your state is not a hyperlink, click on the name of a surrounding state that is linked to a calendar. Evaluations are updated regularly, so an evaluation may come available in your area at any time. NOTE: When displaying the calendar it is best to select 4 months in advance.
3. If you are unable to find an evaluation on the calendar, visit www.deltasociety.org/evaluator to locate an evaluator in your area.

Step 4: Paperwork

Once you complete the evaluation, send all completed paperwork along with your registration fee to Delta Society. After your paperwork is processed, you will receive an acceptance letter with your ID, which will allow you to begin making visits. You must receive the acceptance letter prior to scheduling or making visits. Your permanent ID badge and animal tag will arrive in 3–4 weeks. Time commitment for visits is dependent on your schedule, the population that you are visiting, and the needs of the facility.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. What types of animals can qualify?

A. *Most companion animals including dogs, cats, rabbits, birds, guinea pigs, horses and miniature horses.*

Q. How do I know if my animal might be a candidate for this work?

A. *Animals must be at least 1 year old and have lived in the owner's home for at least 6 months. (Pocket pets such as rabbits, guinea pigs, etc., only need to be 6 months old.) Animals should show no shyness, aggression or fear; demonstrate non-threatening or neutral body position; show a tail that is wagging in a friendly manner, or relaxed; have a soft body and relaxed face; not eliminate during the evaluation (cats and dogs only); vocalize minimally (a single aggressive bark is unacceptable).*

Q. My animal is intact (not spayed or neutered) — can they become registered with Pet Partners?

A. *Yes, however some places may not allow intact animals to participate in their programs.*

Q. I heard that my animal cannot be fed a raw protein diet and participate in this program. Is this true?

A. *Yes. Your animal must be off of a raw protein diet for at least 4 weeks before registering. For more information on Delta Society's raw protein diet policy, please visit www.deltasociety.org/rawdiet.*

Q. What training courses do you provide for the animal?

A. *Delta Society does not provide any training courses for animals. We train the human handler and evaluate and register the team of the animal and the handler.*

Q. Can my children volunteer with me or do this on their own?

A. *Children as young as 10 years old can become registered. They will need to complete the same steps as noted on the reverse side of this page. Children 10–15 years of age must have written permission to participate and must be accompanied on visits by a parent or guardian.*

Q. What is the required volunteer commitment?

A. *We do not require volunteers to commit to any number of hours or visits per year. We recognize that every person's availability and interest is different. Volunteers should maintain a visiting schedule that works for both them and the place(s) they visit. For volunteers interested in becoming an Instructor, 100 hours of documented visits are required; for volunteers interested in becoming a Team Evaluator 50 hours of documented visits are required.*

Q. How do I find a place to visit once I'm registered?

A. *You can network with other local volunteers, Instructors and Evaluators or contact places of interest to you and inquire directly with them. You may also log in to our website (using your User ID/Password) and find facilities looking for teams at www.deltasociety.org/petpartnersneeded. You may also contact our Facility Coordinator at: facilitycoordinator@deltasociety.org*

Q. I have two animals, can I register with both?

A. *Yes, but you need to have a separate evaluation with each animal and complete a separate registration for each animal. A registered team includes one human and one animal combination. Please also note that you must visit with only one animal at a time.*

Q. How much does it cost to do this?

A. *The fee to complete an online course is \$70, fees for in-person workshops range from \$75-\$250, and evaluations range from \$15-\$40. Registration fees paid to Delta Society can be found on the reverse side of this page.*

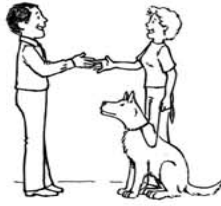

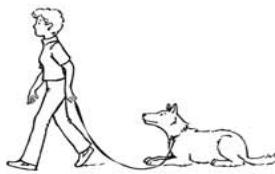

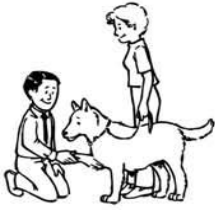
